Read the extract carefully and answer the following questions:

In developing countries, the girls lag behind the boys in education. A large number of them do not go to school. Even when they are enrolled the burden of domestic chores stands in the way of their educational progress. The single most important factor in their poor performance is the time and strain imposed by girl child's workload. Close behind poverty, follows tradition. And perhaps the strongest tradition of all is the idea that sons should be educated because they will be the bread winners of their own future families, and supporters of their aging parents. A girl's work, though it may be longer and harder, is considered less likely to bring monetary income. In culture where marriage means that a daughter becomes the part of her husband's family, the incentive to educate girls is weaker still.

Write a précis of the following passage and give a suitable title :

Starting a production without adequate planning, sometimes even without a shooting script, penchant to convolutions of a plot and counter plot rather than the strong, simple unidirectional narrative: the practice of sandwiching musical numbers in the most unlyrical situations, the habit of shooting indoors in a country which is all landscape, and at a time when all other countries are turning to the documentary for inspiration – all these stand in a way of the evaluation of a distinctive style. There have been rare glimpses of an enlightened approach in a handful of recent films. IPTA's Dharti-ke-Lal is an instance of a strong simple theme put over with style, honesty and technical competence. Shankar's Kalpana, an inimitable and highly individual experiment, shows a grasp of filmic movement, and a respect for tradition.
